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human bones form the most direct link to understanding how people lived in the past who they were and where they came from the interpretative value of human skeletal remains within their burial context in terms of past social identity and organisation is awesome but was for many years underexploited by archaeologists the nineteen papers in this edited volume are an attempt to redress this by marrying the cultural aspects of burial with the anthropology of the deceased

the archaeology of death and burial is central to our attempts to understand vanished societies through the remains of funerary rituals we can learn not only about the attitudes of prehistoric people to death and the afterlife but also about their way of life their social organisation and their view of the world this ambitious book reviews the latest research in this huge and important field and describes the sometimes controversial interpretations that have led to rapid advances in our understanding of life and death in the distant past a unique overview and synthesis of one of the most revealing fields of research into the past it covers archaeology's most breathtaking discoveries from tutankhamen to the ice man and will find a keen market among archaeologists historians and others who have a professional interest in or general curiosity about death and burial

henri duday is director of research for cnrs at the university of bordeaux the archaeology of the dead is based on an intensive specialist course in burial archaeology given by duday in rome in november 2004 the primary aim of the project was to contribute to the development of common procedures for excavation data collection and study of roman cemeteries of the imperial period translated into english by anna maria cipriani and john pearce this book looks at the way in which the analysis of skeletons can allow us to re discover the lives of people who came before us and inform us of their view of death duday thoroughly examines the means at our disposal to allow the dead to speak as well as identifying the pitfalls that may deceive us

the oxford handbook of the archaeology of death and burial reviews the current state of mortuary archaeology and its practice

highlighting its often contentious place in the modern socio politics of archaeology it contains forty four chapters which focus on the history of the discipline and its current scientific techniques and methods written by leading international scholars in the field it derives its examples and case studies from a wide range of time periods such as the middle palaeolithic to the twentieth century and geographical areas which include europe north and south america africa and asia combining up to date knowledge of relevant archaeological research with critical assessments of the theme and an evaluation of future research trajectories it draws attention to the social symbolic and theoretical aspects of interpreting mortuary archaeology the volume is well illustrated with maps plans photographs and illustrations and is ideally suited for students and researchers

in april 1485 a marble sarcophagus was found on the outskirts of rome it contained the remains of a young roman woman so well preserved that she appeared to have only just died and the sarcophagus was placed on public view attracting great crowds such a find reminds us of the power of the dead body to evoke in the minds of living people be they contemporary survivors or mourners or distanced from the remains by time a range of emotions and physical responses ranging from fascination to fear and from curiosity to disgust archaeological interpretations of burial remains can often suggest that the skeletons which we uncover and therefore usually associate with past funerary practices were what was actually deposited in graves rather than articulated corpses the choices made by past communities or individuals about how to cope with a dead body in all of its dynamic and constituent forms and whether there was reason to treat it in a manner that singled it out positively or negatively as different from other human corpses provide the stimulus for this volume the nine papers provide a series of theoretically informed but not constrained case studies which focus predominantly on the corporeal body in death the aims are to take account of the active presence of dynamic material bodies at the heart of funerary events and to explore the questions that might be asked about their treatment to explore ways of putting fleshed bodies back into our discussions of burials and mortuary treatment as well as interpreting the meaning of these activities in relation to the bodies of both deceased and survivors and to combine the insights that body centered analysis can produce to contribute to a more nuanced understanding of the role of the body living and dead in past cultures

historical burial grounds are an enormous archaeological resource and have the potential to inform studies not only of demography or the history of disease and mortality but also histories of the body of religious and other beliefs about death of changing social relationships values and aspirations in the last decades the intensive urban development and a widespread legal requirement to undertake archaeological excavation of historical sites has led to a massive increase in the number of post medieval graveyards and burial places that have been subjected to archaeological investigation the archaeology of the more recent periods which are comparatively well documented is no less interesting and important an area of study than prehistoric periods this volume offers a range of case studies and reflections on aspects of death and burial in post medieval europe looking at burial goods the spatial aspects of cemetery organisation and the way that the living interact with the dead contributors who have worked on sites from central north and west europe present some of their evidence and ideas the coherence of the volume is maintained by a substantial integrative introduction by the editor professor sarah tarlow this book is a first and a necessary one it is an exciting and far ranging collection of studies on post medieval burial practice across europe that will most certainly be used extensively professor howard williams

the forms by which a deceased person may be brought to rest are as many as there are causes of death in most societies the disposal of the corpse is accompanied by some form of celebration or ritual which may range from a simple act of deportment in solitude to the engagement of large masses of people in laborious and creative festivities in a funerary context the term ritual may be taken to represent a process that incorporates all the actions performed and thoughts expressed in connection with a dying and dead person from the preparatory pre death stages to the final deposition of the corpse and the post mortem stages of grief and commemoration the contributions presented here are focused not on the examination of different funerary practices their function and meaning but on the changes of such rituals how and when they occurred and how they may be explained based on case studies from a range of geographical regions and from different prehistoric and historical periods a range of key themes are examined concerning belief and ritual body and deposition place performance and commemoration exploring a complex web of

this open access book explores the role of textiles in death to investigate questions into how the body was prepared before the funeral how the body was seen and perceived by its relatives and community and the role of textiles in its metamorphosis into a deceased the volume's geographic coverage is broad encompassing areas where textile and skeletal conservation is optimal the ancient nile valley and areas where only minute fragments could be preserved adhering to metal objects the case studies cover egypt sudan greece the iberian peninsula scandinavia and central europe ranging from the 12th century bce to the end of the 19th century ce going beyond this geohistorical frameworks the book presents new methods for the study retrieval and conservation of funerary textiles in situ during excavations it offers useful tools for future research in both textile archaeology and bioarcheology and promote interdisciplinary collaborations between the two fields for a better understanding of burial practices contributors to this volume include experts from the fields of bioanthropology archaeology textile research and conservation

the routledge handbook of archaeothanatology spans the gap between archaeology and biological anthropology the field and laboratory and between francophone and anglophone funerary archaeological approaches to the remains of the dead and the understanding of societies past and present interest in archaeothanatology has grown considerably in recent years in english language scholarship this timely publication moves away from anecdotal case studies to offer syntheses of archaeothanatological approaches with an eye to higher level inferences about funerary behaviour and its meaning in the past written by francophone scholars who have contributed to the development of the field and anglophone scholars inspired by the approach this volume offers detailed insight into the background and development of archaeothanatology its theory methods applications and its most recent advances with a lexicon of related vocabulary this volume is a key source for archaeo anthropologists and bioarchaeologists it will benefit researchers lecturers practitioners and students in biological anthropology archaeology taphonomy and forensic science given the interdisciplinary nature of these disciplines and the emphasis placed on analysis in situ this book will also be of interest to specialists in entomology micro biology and soil science

places are social lived ideational landscapes constructed by people as they inhabit their natural and built environment an archaeology of place attempts to move beyond the understanding of the landscape as inert background or static fossil of human behaviour from a specifically mortuary perspective this approach entails a focus on the inherently mutable transient and performative qualities of deathscapes how they are remembered obliterated forgotten reworked or revisited over time despite latent interest in this line of enquiry few studies have explored the topic explicitly in aegean archaeology this book aims to identify ways in which to think about the deathscape as a cross between landscapes tombs bodies and identities supplementing and expanding upon well explored themes in the field e g tombs as vehicles for the legitimization of power funeral landscapes as arenas of social and political competition the volume recasts a wealth of knowledge about aegean mortuary cultures against a theoretical background bringing the field up to date with recent developments in the archaeology of place

first comprehensive study of the processes ritual and practices involved in the cremation of human bodies and the methodologies that can be applied to the study of cremated human remains using both new and traditional methods of study

this study explores the insights into provincial roman societies that can be gained from the archaeological evidence for burial practice focused on britain drawing on wider work in the archaeology of death it evaluates the distribution of burial evidence and the factors that condition it including it is argued archaeologically invisible burial continuing from the iron age it reviews the archaeological evidence for cremation rituals and explores how social status was expressed through burial primarily in case studies from south east england funeral ritual was a dynamic arena for asserting social status throughout the roman period taking forms that can be read as both traditional and roman the setting of burial is assessed to establish spatial relationships between living and dead in town and country and the distribution of funerary display across the landscape

there is a considerable body of knowledge on the concepts and practices of inhumation yet our understanding of cremation ritual and practice is by comparison woefully inadequate this volume draws together the inventive methodology that has been developed

for this material and combines it with a fuller interpretation of the archaeological funerary context it demonstrates how an innovative methodology when applied to a challenging material can produce new and exciting interpretations of archaeological sites and funerary contexts the reader is introduced to the nature of burned human remains and the destructive effect that fire can have on the body subsequent chapters describe important cremation practices and sites from around the world and from the neolithic period to the modern day by emphasising the need for a robust methodology combined with a nuanced interpretation it is possible to begin to appreciate the significance and wide spread adoption of this practice of dealing with the dead provided by publisher

this book analyses in detail the funerary evidence from burial sites in southern and central sardinia proposing an alternative interpretation of the island and of other roman provinces in which local communities played an active and creative role in shaping back the roman world within the specific material and historical conditions they lived in

the mummy a handbook of egyptian funerary archaeology is linguist and orientalist e a wallis budge s detailed overview of egyptian funeral practices and beliefs included is a history of egypt as well as the translation of common hieroglyphs to augment readers understanding of egyptian culture he describes in detail the wrapping and burying of mummies the attendants to the tombs and the dead drawings and hieroglyphs found on tomb walls coffins and sarcophagi treasures buried with the dead and scarabs among other things this book is a beautiful complement to the book of the dead which describes the egyptian afterlife and the motivations for detailed and drawn out burials this edition is the revised and enlarged edition originally published in 1925 sir ernest alfred thompson wallis budge 1857 1934 was born in bodmin cornwall in the uk and discovered an interest in languages at a very early age budge spent all his free time learning and discovering semitic languages including assyrian syriac and hebrew eventually through a close contact he was able to acquire a job working with egyptian and iraqi artifacts at the british museum budge excavated and deciphered numerous cuneiform and hieroglyphic documents contributing vastly to the museum s collection eventually he became the keeper of his department specializing in egyptology budge wrote many books during his lifetime most specializing in egyptian life religion and language

this practical volume focuses on the study of historic burial ground monuments but also covers some below ground archaeology as some projects will involve the study of both it will be an incomparable source for academic archaeologists cultural resource and heritage management archaeologists government heritage agencies and upper level undergraduate and graduate students of archaeology focused on the historic or post medieval period as well as forensic researchers and anthropologists

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
